Mum's trek fundraiser to help prevent suicide

SORAYA Saraswati thought she knew grief after watching her first husband "drink himself to death" and then her brother kill himself.

But nothing could compare with the harrowing trauma after her nearly 18-year-old son also took his own life seven years ago.

Both her brother, Gill Gardiner, and son, Prem, died on the same day two years apart.

It was September 10, World Suicide Prevention Day.

"Neither was aware of that," she said.

Ms Saraswati spent several years "going through grief", now she is in a place where she is ready to make a difference.

"I'm in a great place in my life," she said.

"I have three other sons and a wonderful husband. While there will always be a sad part in my heart for my

son and brother, life is good. I am not a victim."

She has completed the Suicide Prevention Lived Experience Speakers Bureau program and is open to speak on the subject.

And she is also preparing to walk the 150km Larapinta Trail from Alice Springs for the Suicide Prevention Association and raise funds every step along the way.

"With over seven people dying by suicide every day in Australia, it is a national tragedy," she said.

"More people die of suicide than on Australian roads. This is clearly an important subject.

"Education and research as well as action all play a role in saving lives."

The funds she raises will be used for the association to

fund indigenous people to attend the National Suicide Prevention Conference in Canberra in August.

Ms Saraswati needs help to make the trek a success.

She has organised a Shin-
